## Amazing Strength

For 150 years, Metropolitan Family Services has been a voice for families in Chicago's city and suburban communities. With compassionate counsel and services for families struggling to overcome incredible challenges, Metropolitan makes a difference in each individual's life.

Metropolitan's credentialed staff members include social workers, lawyers, financial counselors and educators, working together to ensure families receive the support and resources needed to help them reach their potential.

With a community focus, Metropolitan is able to constantly adapt to help with evolving issues. Seven centers in the city and suburbs offer open, inviting spaces for children and adults to receive services tailored to their concerns:

- Nurturing children to help them realize their promise.
- Addressing mental health needs of children, teens and adults.
- Providing counseling services that build on family strengths and capacity.
- Supporting young parents to be the best parents they can be.
- Offering families care options for aging relatives.
- Intervening in the deadly cycle of family and neighborhood violence.
- Connecting clients with community resources.
- Guiding youth and adults in money management skills to establish stable financial futures.

## Programs and Services

### Fostering Mental Health and Well-being *Counseling and Mental Health*

Counseling, case management and psychiatric services for families and individuals of all ages provide needed guidance while focusing on positive change and growth. Services build on individual and family strengths and capacity for change while addressing behavioral problems, special needs and difficult life situations.

### Nurturing Children, Youth and Their Families *Child and Youth Development, Parenting Services*

Services help strengthen children's relationships with families and counteract high-risk behaviors. Improving problem-solving and academic skills help youth navigate developmental milestones and lead toward making healthy choices. Programs, such as parenting education and support services, help families function at the highest possible level.

### Equipping Families with Financial Knowledge *Financial Literacy*

Economic services such as budget counseling and money management education enable families to develop financial management skills and access available financial resources.

### Advocating for Families and Communities *Social Policy, Community Development*

Social Policy advocates at state and federal levels to help implement legislation to strengthen families. Policy solutions focus on issues such as child support, payday loan reform and affordable housing. In addition, community development initiatives create partnerships that help Chicago-area communities in areas of planning, coalition building and public education.

### Providing Legal Assistance *Legal Aid Bureau*

The Legal Aid Bureau provides assistance in family law and elder abuse with services to protect the elderly against abuse and financial exploitation and to protect victims of domestic violence, along with essential violence intervention programs to help them rebuild their lives.

### Strengthening Employee Support Systems *Employee Assistance Network*

Customized counseling programs and management consultation services are provided to help employees at all levels create a healthy balance in their lives and be more productive on the job.
